We work closely with the Local Authority and the Vine Trust so we at Bulphan C of E Academy have a similar approach to meeting the needs of pupils with Special Educational Needs to ensure that all pupils, regardless of their specific needs, make the best possible progress in school. We are supported to be as inclusive as possible, with the needs of pupils with a Special Educational Need/s and or disabilities being met in a mainstream setting wherever possible, where families want this to happen.

	A school's provision for SEND is defined as, support which is additional to or different from that which is available to all students.
2. What are our policies for identifying children and young people with SEND and how do we assess their needs?	At Bulphan C of E Academy, we recognise that students make progress at different rates and not always in a steady pattern. Therefore, students are identified as having SEND in a variety of ways, including the following: • Liaison with Academy/previous school • The student performing significantly below expected levels/making slow progress • Concerns raised by parent/carer • Concerns raised by teacher • Liaison with external agencies, e.g. physical health diagnosis from paediatrician If a student is identified as having SEND then their name will be added to the SEND Support Register, but we recognise that students' needs may change over time and provision must reflect this. The aim of any additional intervention and school support is for the student to be working closer to or at age expectations, so once they reach this threshold they may be removed from the school SEND register. If they fall behind again at any point, then they may be added to the register again.
3. How do we consult parents of children with SEND and involve them in their child's education?	We will invite you to visit the school with your child to speak to staff. If other professionals are involved, we will meet them or contact them to discuss your child's needs, share strategies, and ensure provision is put in place before your child starts. Depending on your child's needs, we may suggest transition visits or adaptations to the settling in period to help your child to settle more easily. If your child is to have a key person involved, we will arrange times when they can meet you and your child to get to know each other. We may ask if we can carry out a home visit to make your child feel at ease about starting at Bulphan C of E Academy. When your child leaves us at the end of Key Stage Two or at any point in the school year, we arrange transition meetings with the new setting and a full transition program. This may also be the case for some children transitioning between Key Stage One and Key Stage Two. If you have concerns about your child's progress, you should speak to your child's class teacher initially. If you are not happy that the concerns are being managed and that your child is still not making progress, you should speak to the Special Educational Needs Co-Ordinator (SENCo), Inclusion Manager or Head Teacher. When a teacher or a parent has raised concerns about your child's progress, and targeted teaching has not met the child's needs, the teacher will raise this with the SENCo or Inclusion Manager. Our school also has pupil progress meetings every term between each class teacher and a senior staff member in the school to ensure all children are making good progress. This is another way your child may be identified as not making as much progress as expected. We use Pupil Asset as a way of

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	measuring progress and have introduced other tools to measure smaller steps of progress such as the Salford Reading Test,

	Twice a year, there are parents evening which give parents the opportunity to discuss their child's progress with the class				
	teacher and also other issues such as learning behaviour, attendance etc.				
	If your child is in Year 1 and above, but is not yet at National Curriculum bands, a more sensitive assessment tool is used which				
	shows their level in more detail and will also show smaller but significant steps of progress. This is called Early Learning Goals.				
	If a child has severe SEND, their progressed may be measured in a smaller, more manageable way.				
	At the end of each key stage (i.e. at the end of Year Two and end of Year Six), all children are required to be formally assessed				
	using Standard Assessment Tests (SATS). This is something the government requires all schools to do and are the results that				
	are published nationally. If we feel a child is unable to access the test, special provision can be made or the child can be				
	disapplied from the tests if this is more appropriate. Parents will always be informed of a school's decision and the reasons				
	why.				
	All children at the school have learning targets. These targets are clearly presented in the children's books through the use of				
	learning ladders (child friendly grids linked to the new National Curriculum). Children with a SEND may have a learning ladder				
	which is more appropriate to their ability. At the end of the term, teachers will use these Learning Ladders to help inform				
	their formative assessments and measure the progress of each child in the core curriculum areas.				
	The progress of children with an EHC Plan is formally reviewed at an Annual Review with all adults involved with the child's				
	education.				

6. What are our arrangements for supporting children moving between phases of education?	The SENCo or Inclusion Manager will also check that your child is making good progress within any individual work and in any group that they take part in. Every child on the SEN register will have a SEN Learning Journey which can document their work in intervention and can be used to measure progress. A range of ways may be used to keep you informed, which may include: Home/school book, letters/certificates sent home, additional meetings as required, reports, rewards and celebrations. We recognise that 'moving on' can be difficult for a child with SEND/and or disabilities and take steps to ensure that any transition is a smooth as possible. • If your child is moving to another school: We will contact the new school's SENCo or Inclusion Manager and ensure he/she knows about any special arrangements or support that need to be made for your child. We will make sure that all records about your child are passed on as soon as possible. We make arrangements for staff who have worked with your child to meet new staff. Where understanding might be difficult, your child will visit their new school on several occasions and in some cases staff from the new school will visit your child in this school. • When moving classes in school: Information, including learning targets, will be passed on to the new class teacher in advance. For children with EHCP and more complex needs, there will be a planning meeting and / or specific preparation or training for the new teacher and / or support staff. If your child would be helped by a book to support them understand moving on, then it will be		
7. What is our approach to teaching children with SEND?	If your child would be helped by a book to support them understand moving on, then it will be made for them. Class Teachers plan lessons according to the specific needs of all groups of children in their class, and will ensure that learning tasks are adjusted in order to enable your child to learn as independently as possible. Specially trained support staff can implement the teachers modified/adapted planning to support the needs of your child where necessary. In addition, all teaching staff and learning support assistants have been trained on how to use the Essex Provision Guidance Toolkit which offers a range of approaches to support children in class using High Quality teaching to make progress. At any time according to need, a combination of any of the following strategies may be in place including, behaviour charts/rewards, visual timetables, left-handed scissors, writing slope, 5 minute boxes, a wide range of reading materials, Interactive Whiteboards, social stories, dedicated programmes to help with Speech and Language, dyslexia, social skills etc. Planning and teaching will be adapted on a daily basis if needed to meet your child's learning needs and increase your child's access to what is on offer. If a child does need additional support than that in the classroom, a targeted and specific provision map is drawn up which details all the extra support in terms of intervention, resources etc that your child might need.		
8. How do we adapt our curriculum and learning environment to suit children with SEND? This may involve things like using more practical learning or providing different resources adapted for your child. Putting in place specific strategies (which may be suggested by the SENCo, Inclusion Manager or staff from outside agencies) to enable your child to access the learning task progress.
9. What expertise do our staff have to enable them to teach children with SEND?	Class Teacher	He/ She is responsible for: Ensuring that all children have access to good/outstanding teaching and that the curriculum is adapted to meet your child's individual needs (also known as differentiation). Checking on the progress of your child and identifying, planning and delivering any additional help your child may need (this could be things like targeted work, additional support, adapting resources etc) and discussing amendments with the SENCo or Inclusion Manager as necessary. Writing learning targets and sharing and discussing these with parents twice a year at parent's consultations. Ensuring that all members of staff working with your child in school are aware of your child's individual needs and/or conditions and what specific adjustments need to be made to enable them to be included and make progress. Creating an appropriate provision map for all the children in their class with SEND and detailing the support given to that child in able to improve their learning. Liaising with the SENCo or Inclusion Manger to create an appropriate One Plan for any children with SEND which specific targets which are tailored to suit the individual child's needs. These then are reviewed on a termly basis using the assess-plan-do-review approach and adjusted according to the child's progress. The parents and children always play an active role in the creation of this document and are invited in to share their thoughts and ideas for this. Ensuring that all staff working with your child in school are supported in delivering the planned work/programme for your child, so they can achieve the best possible progress. This may involve the use of additional adults, outside specialist help and specially planned work and resources. Ensuring that the school's Inclusion/SEND Policy is followed in their classroom and for all the pupils they teach with any SEND.
